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UPDATE ON BACKLOG OF CAR PLATES AND LOG BOOKS

t is good news for motor vehicle owners following the confirmation that the backlog of applications for number plates at the **National Transport and Safety Authority** (NTSA) will be cleared within the next two weeks.

Interior Chief Administrative Secretary (CAS), Amb. Hussein Dado, appeared before the National Assembly's Departmental Committee on Administration and National Security and clarified that the situation was caused by a delay in the delivery of raw materials due to supply chain disruptions occasioned by the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Department of Correctional Services, which is the institution mandated to make car plates in the country, paid for the consignment back in April, but the supplier couldn't service the order within the timelines agreed due to longer custom export clearances and strained manufacturing and logistics lines. However, the consignment has been delivered to the Kamiti Maximum Security Prison, and the institution is working off-the-clock in the production of the plates with a view to clearing the backlog within **fourteen days**.

Motor vehicle dealers and owners have had to contend with congestion at the Port of

Mombasa, but NTSA recently asked the Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA) to authorize the release of all vehicles duly registered and issue the owners or dealers with e-stickers upon verification of the registration status of such vehicles.

In addition, printing of log books has also begun at the Government Printer after a brief pause caused by the breakdown of a specialized security machine whose spare parts had to be imported. The backlog is expected to be cleared within the shortest time possible.

Since the resumption of printing last week, a total of **40,000 (forty thousand) logbooks** had been printed and duly collected by NTSA as **August 24, 2021.**

Through the National Cohesion and Integration Commission (NCIC), NCCK and other nonstate actors, the government is progressively reactivating community dialogues in various counties. The Cabinet Secretary also reiterated that there is adequate preparedness to facilitate peaceful elections and challenged Kenyan youth to reject political persuasions anchored on violence, division, negative ethnicity, and dangerous sloganeering.

"We are committed to see to it that not a single bullet is shot, no mwananchi is hurt, and every Kenyan has the opportunity to take part in

shaping governance and democracy in our country," he said.

Dr. Matiang'i divulged that the government has mapped out all insecurity prone hot spots in the country to inform allocation and deployment of security resources before, during, and after the elections.

The CS also called for responsible use of social media amid growing concerns over hate and vitriol spewed online. Citing Kenya's progressive democracy, the CS was categorical that the government won't gag any form of free speech in the country, but warned that the law will be applied if and when the red line on the use of the Internet is crossed.

The campaign will also be supported through various talk shows in the local languages and highly visualized digital communication across the NTSA social media pages and the radio/Television station platforms.
