


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New Kenya-UK Compact Promises Better Security

enya and the UK signed a **Security Compact** with the intent to guide their **strategic cooperation** in **addressing the emerging national, regional** and **global security threats**.

After signing the Compact, **CS Kithure Kindiki** noted: "We have also signed an agreement for cooperation in the area of training of our National Police Service. We want to continually develop the capacity of our tactical specialized units to combat sophisticated criminal activities, including banditry and money laundering."

UK's Minister of State for Security **Tom Tugendhat** said: "The challenges that face the region — at sea, on land, and in cyberspace — challenges us both. So, working together is the only way to secure the British people, just as it is the only way to secure the Kenyan people."

The two countries continue to enjoy mutual support, and the latest agreement spells improved strategies on the war against terrorism and collaboration in aviation and maritime security operations.

Kenya, Ethiopia and Somalia Unite to Secure their Borderlands

B order insecurity and threats remain among the greatest challenges that even the strongest economies in the world have been struggling to overcome.

Kenya and Ethiopia share one operational border point at Moyale with the potential of eight others along the 867-kilometres borderline. With Somalia, Mandera, Liboi and Kiunga are the existing border points with the potential of three more along the 684-kilometres borderline. These borderlands present unique challenges in securing, and it is apparent that there is no one-size-fits-all solution to this problem.

With an understanding that it will take a **multifaceted approach** and continuous efforts to stay ahead of evolving threats, the three countries have set about tackling **illegal**

immigration, trafficking and **terrorism** among other security threats along their shared borders.

With support from the **UK Government**, the three neighbours have launched the **Borderlands Assistance Security Project**, conceptualized to enhance their cross-border security cooperation.

During the launch, which was presided over by **Deputy President Rigathi Gachagua**, **CS Kithure** noted that the project will proceed subject to the three partner states sitting down together with the UK to agree on the action plan.

The event was also attended by **UK High Commissioner** to Kenya **Jane Marriott**, **PS Dr. Raymond Omollo**, and high-level delegations from **Ethiopia** and **Somalia**.





Kindiki: Our War is Against Cultic Practices, Not Religion

he Shakahola deaths have tightened our grip on reality and the precarious nature of **religious extremism**. When **CS Kithure Kindiki** declared a war against rogues advancing unorthodox teachings and criminal activities under the guise of worshipping, there erupted grumbles and querulous murmurs that the state was out to clamp down on religious groups.

However, the CS recently clarified that the **government is not** at war with religion, but is focused on ridding the country of criminals **misappropriating their religious influence** for

ulterior motives. He further reiterated the commitment to upholding **freedom of worship**, but warned that nothing will stop the efforts to weed out cultic activities.

He was speaking at **St. Joseph Benedict Cottolengo Chaaria Catholic Church** in Meru during a special mass organizes by the **Chaaria Parish** to rally support for children living with mental and physical disabilities.





Government Prioritizes Prisoners' Welfare

he government is set to launch new measures aimed at decongesting prisons and reduce the population of inmates within the correctional facilities by 50 percent.

Interior Cabinet Secretary **Kithure Kindiki** has divulged that the Ministry has embarked on consultations with key stakeholders to bring about a transformative change and improve the state of the prisons industry in the country.

"What we currently have is disastrous; we have almost double the capacity that our prisons are supposed to hold," he said, adding that the plans have been put in place to promote the adoption of restorative justice practices and alternatives to incarceration.

While in the company of PS for Correctional Services Mary Muthoni, CS Kindiki made the announcement during his



recent visit to **Mwea GK Prison**, where he added that a new policy has also been drafted to accelerate the reforms in the correctional services. With a focus on **inmate welfare** and **aftercare services**, the policy promises to bring about positive change through rehabilitation and successful reintegration of offenders back into society.

The policy prioritizes the welfare of prisoners, with each inmate set to be supplied with two new pairs of uniforms, a bed and a mattress.

Race against Time to Solve Refugee Crisis

id you know that hosting refugees is a global responsibility that requires countries to provide refuge and support to victims of conflict, persecution, or any other reason? However, this obligation comes with a **financial burden** and poses **serious security challenges** on the host countries.

Kenya is home to about **800,000 refugees** and **asylum seekers**, which makes among the **top 20 refugee hosts** in the **world**, and, through the **Kenya Marshall Plan for Refugees**, the government is now seeking to facilitate their self-reliance and ease the pressure on the host communities.

An Intergovernmental Steering Committee has been formed to develop the plan, which will also guide the process of transitioning from refugee camps to integrated settlements.

According to PS for Immigration and Citizen Services, "At the heart of the Marshall Plan is the host community. We will work to ensure the host community members are the direct beneficiaries of all development programmes in refugee hosting areas."

On his part, PS for Internal Security and National Administration, **Dr. Raymond Omollo**, said intelligence reports have shown instances during which the refugee population has been used as a cover for criminal and terrorist

activities, but expressed optimism that the Marshall Plan will present a viable solution to this challenge.

He said: "The integrated approach will help us deal with acts of terrorism because we will be able to empower even the host communities so that they can identify potential troublemakers."

The situation has also brought to light an increase in **smuggling** and **human trafficking**, which further exacerbates the security situation in affected areas, which Dr. Omollo said the government of Kenya has undertaken to address through the **Refugees Act, No. 10 of 2021.**





Children as Young as 6 Introduced to Drug Abuse, NACADA Report

he government has sounded an alarm about a more pervasive trend of **skyrocketing alcoholism** and **drug abuse** in the country following dramatic surges in the last half-decade.

There are concerns that **cannabis** is rapidly becoming a **mainstream substance**, with latest statistics indicating that its use has increased by a staggering **90 percent** in just the past **five years**.

The latest report by the National Authority for the Campaign against Alcohol and Drug Abuse (NACADA) reveals a disturbing truth: alcohol reigns as the most prevalent substance of choice in Kenya, gripping an alarming 1 in every 8 individuals aged 15-65 years, equivalent to a staggering 3,199,119 people.

However, what's truly concerning is the report's revelation that over **1 million Kenyans** – or **1** in every **20** people in this age group – are addicted to **alcohol**, a trend PS for Internal Security **Dr. Raymond Omollo** has described as a "stark and sobering" and necessitates urgent interventions.

He said, "A walk around our villages and informal

settlements will give you a sense of the drug-infested communities we now have where entire populations, both male and female, are drunk and high."

The National Survey Report on the Status of Drugs and Substance Use in Kenya 2022 also indicates that children as young as 6 years old are being introduced to a range of dangerous and addictive substances, with such early exposure likely to lead to severe and long-lasting consequences.

As the top policy makers and accounting officers, they are expected inculcate accountability, ethical conduct, and responsiveness in the workforce under them.



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



he heavy rains pounding many parts across the country have triggered **flash floods** that are leaving a large trail of cases of death and destruction.
